

2018 LCWR National Assembly

Earlier this month the three of us were among the 800 leaders of religious congregations who attended the LCWR National Assembly which took place in St. Louis. Ursulines from the eastern province as well as from the independent Ursuline congregations were there, and it's always a joy to be together. This year's theme was "Being the

Presence of Love: The Power of Communion."
We focused on the urgent need to foster communion and connection in our increasingly polarized world. The three keynote speakers explored insights from new understandings of Trinitarian theology and

In April Sue Anne Cole & Thomas More Daly attended an archive meeting entitled "A Day for Dreaming". It was held at St. Mary's College at Notre Dame. Congregations of sisters from the mid-west were invited to explore ways of establishing a common repository for their archives.

In July, Thomas More Daly and Maria Teresa de Llano participated in the national meeting of archivists at Boston College entitled "Envisioning the Future of National Religious Archives". There were more than 160 archivists, researchers and leaders of communities who participated in discussions and presentations.

Both meetings have been very informative and encouraging as we move forward on the proposal approved by RULUSA to find a common place to bring our U.S.A. archives together in a central place. This will preserve our stories, make materials available to researchers and preserve our emerging future.

The Rent Collector

Namron Wright was inspired to write this work of fiction by his son's work on a documentary titled "River of Victory." The documentary follows the life of Sang Ly, a Cambodian

> woman living at Stung Meanchey (literally "river of victory".)



RENT

COLLECTOR

Sang Ly lives with her husband, Ki Lim, and their young son Nisay at Stung Meanchey, the largest municipal waste dump in Cambodia. Although their home is three cardboard walls and a tarp "curtain," they must pay rent each month to live there. The Rent Collector is usually drunk, always mean and seemingly unrelenting about collecting the rent in full on the day it is due. There

is a moment, however, when Sang Ly realizes that Sopeap Sin (the rent collector) knows how to read. Somewhat reluctantly Sopeap Sin agrees to Sang Ly's request to teach her.

As their relationship develops, Sang Ly learns a secret about the ill-tempered woman—a secret that dates back to the Khmer Rouge and sets in motion a tide that will change the life of everyone it sweeps past. The Rent Collector powerfully illustrates how literacy can change lives. It also illustrates the necessity of seeing more deeply than the externals to know a person, and the power of the human spirit to endure.
