As we move deeper into the Easter season, we wish us all fresh vision and insight to recognize the Risen Christ in new and familiar places!




General Chapter Update: Central Province Delegates

Ye've all been there:


- Shocked, unhappy at the growing expanse of gray hair --- or maybe just the growing expanse!

Elizabeth Susan Hatzenbuehler shares her experience.

In San Antonio, Texas, Elizabeth Susan Hatzenbuehler facilitates a Meditative Coloring group twice a week at Haven for Hope,

an 11.5 acre campus for persons experiencing homelessness. Other volunteers now fill in the rest of the week. In addition, the staff offers a "checkout" system for coloring supplies/pages that Sister keeps filled.



An Angela Merici Grant has provided supplies for the project for two years.

At Haven for Hope, in a lovely small Chapel stretched to meet multiple needs, I invite you to imagine the simple setup: a few tables, chairs, whimsical "free printable" internet pages, markers, pencils, crayons – oh, and don't forget the gentle, soft music you will hear. Welcome! This is a Meditative Coloring group for adults.

Men and women know that here they will find quiet and space to just be and that their problems clamoring for attention might fade a bit. This simple gift of being able to ponder images and colors can be the planting of seeds of interior peace, while the depth of the quiet within the room becomes a special grace for all of us.

For participants these pictures are often a part of their stories and a way to share that with others. As a result we now have three bulletin boards in the area. One of our early participants so proudly kept a whole binder, a "portfolio" of her completed pictures, and wanted to have an art exhibit for everyone's pictures. Before that could happen, she told me she would be moving into a senior living complex. I cherish what she shared with me, "Coloring helps me to understand my heart"
