

Continuing to Share Our Story . . .

Pauline Lorch shares her experience tutoring refugee women.

Because St. Louis has a well-organized and many-faceted International Institute, many refugees are sent here. Mary Lapping has volunteered for one program which teaches English to refugee women in their homes. There are presently 250 tutors teaching English to refugee women. Another 227 women are on the waiting list for a tutor, so I volunteered. There are a variety of reasons why these women have not learned English. Some do not understand a very different culture. Some are uncomfortable or even fearful of going out alone in a strange city, and some need childcare.

Since joining the project about a year and a half ago I have worked with a Bosnian woman who had been here for 16 years and knew no English. I have also tutored a highly educated Afghan woman whose husband was a government official there. From Mina I learned much about the situation in Afghanistan and the extended family with whom she lived. The family came to the US because a young family member had been a translator for the Marines and he had been invited to immigrate.

Kelly, originally from Greece, is the woman with whom I am presently working. Kelly's story is complicated by the fact that her husband, who is a US citizen, divorced her fraudulently



despite her efforts to contest, and as a result she was left homeless. Through Catholic Charities, she was able to get a job at a nursing home sponsored by Cardinal Ritter Senior Services. If you can believe it, most recently I have been working with her on finances. Due to her lack of understanding what was told to her, she is now dealing with two collection agencies. Despite all this, Kelly is a very positive and enjoyable student and now she has the goal of becoming a US citizen.

So over the past year and a half, I have learned a lot about the desperation of the homeless, the fear experienced by refugees, and the joy and determination of women as they try to learn to function in a culture not their own.



Social Justice Notes

It may seem a long way away, but Earth Day 2019 is April 22nd. The theme for this year is "Protect Our Species" and

here is the <u>link</u> to the Earth Day website where resources are available. Rachel Carson wrote: "In nature, nothing exists alone." It is all of a piece. We need to continue to be concerned about the devastation caused by our use of

disposable plastic goods which are a danger to the environment and various species. Plastic pollution was last year's theme.

Please continue to pray and to advocate for an end to violence on so many levels including xenophobic speech, incivility and gun violence. The New Zealand response to the dreadful attack there is one to emulate. Immigrants at our borders and in our country continue to need our prayers, our support and our advocacy.
