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The celebration of EARTH DAY 2024 on April 22 provides the backdrop for the April issue of <u>Heart to Heart</u>. We begin with a reflection from Sr. Dianne Baumunk of the USA Roman Union Western Province sharing her province's engagement in an international Roman Union commitment to integral ecology.

For a number of years, the three USA Roman Union Ursuline provinces have been involved in the Laudato Si' Action Platform. Last year the entire Roman Union made a commitment to the Platform, and the USA provinces are participating. Two excellent facilitators, Jacqui Remond from Australia and Megan Seneque from South Africa, were hired to work with a core team of Ursulines as animators. Along with two members of the general leadership team, one from Indonesia and one from Brazil, and sisters from France, Africa and Indonesia, Sr. Dianne Baumunk from the USA Western Province rounded out this diverse team.

The team began by co-creating an experience of integral ecology for all the provincials at last year's Enlarged General Council in Rome. This year each province on 6 continents was invited to choose at least three participants (leadership sister, younger sister and lay) for an online pilgrimage of transformation to become the animators of integral ecology in their provinces. These monthly two-and-half hour modules have focused on the goals of the *Laudato Si'* Action Platform and led more than 90 pilgrims on a journey of envisioning and co-creating an integrated ecological future.

The challenges of busy schedules, span of time zones, difference of culture and language have been juggled to provide an experience of integral ecology imbued with the charism of Angela. The pilgrims have been stretched to new levels of personal growth and have been enriched by a variety of experiences, reflections, discussions, and the diversity of the groups themselves. We are building a world-wide network of animators to help us co-create a future for our common home.

In the Western Province our animator team consists of Sr. Margaret Johnson and two lay associates, Jennifer Beller and Barbara Aston. As a province we have invited a number of lay men and women to join us monthly for our own integral ecology

experience and our animator team has taken the lead in those. Yes, we are a small province, but once a month we double in size for a lively experience and sharing that enriches us all.

Associate Barbara Aston describes this journey for her: "It has been such a gift to have been invited to participate in the International Integral Ecology program of the Roman Union as an animator for the Western Province. As animator in training, we are the recipients of the labor, insights, and prayers of those who have designed and are presenting this program. We in turn have the privilege of sharing it within the province. The response from participants has been life-giving as we take the principles and introduce them in our journey together towards a transformation that will enable us to make a difference in our world and for our world. The greatest impact for me personally has been connecting with individuals of a like mind and heart who are seeking understanding and action. I am experiencing at a gut level the power of community! We are not alone in facing the future and living out the Call for the Care of the Earth and the Care of the Poor! Praise God!"
