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“Serviam” – “I Will Serve” – is the motto for our Ursuline Roman Union schools. In each school, the words of St. Angela Merici – “You have more need to serve others than they have to be served by you...” – help to shape a culture of service that is meant to extend into the students’ adult years, wherever life may lead them. For this issue of Heart to Heart, former students and alums of Ursuline schools share reflections on how, in their adult lives, they are continuing to live the spirit of Serviam.

And for this I am humbly and eternally grateful to the Dedham Ursuline Sisters for instilling this spirit of service in me.
